SCORPICA by G. R. Macallister

Sophisticated, complicated, elevated epic fantasy. BLUEBIRD by Sharon Cameron

An incredible novel based on the true and shocking Project Bluebird, Nashville's own Sharon Cameron has created a stellar YA thriller that blew me away. □□ December Recipe: Blackened Halibut



What could be better than something simple and delicious for the holidays? We're all short on time, our nerves are frazzled, and there are so many delicious annual traditions out there to make that I find myself on those in-between days looking for utter simplicity. Blackened Halibut (or any mild white fish) is my go-to. Simply heat EVOO in a pan, wash and dry a halibut filet, sprinkle it with Spiceology Black Magic, cook for five minutes, flip, sprinkle the other side, and go for another five or until your desired level of doneness is reached. While the fish is cooking, I fork two baked potatoes, rub them in olive oil and sprinkle them with salt and pepper, and microwave for five minutes on each side. Boom. Ten minutes to a delicious, fresh, hot, and relatively healthy dinner. (Spiceology makes a great holiday gift, BTW...)
